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Regional Consortium Planning for AE

\$25 Million Statewide for 2 Year Planning AB 86, Section 76, Article 3

The CC Chancellor and CDE Superintendent will jointly provide 2-year planning and implementation grants to regional consortia of community college districts and school districts for the purpose of developing regional plans to better serve the educational needs of adults. A consortium must include at least one Community College District and one K-12 Adult School.

The consortia will use funding to develop regional plans for adult education in:

- Elementary and basic skills; classes required for high school diploma or equivalency certificate;
- Classes for immigrants: ESL, citizenship, and workforce preparation;
- Programs for adults with disabilities;
- Short term CTE programs with high employment potential; and
- Programs for apprentices.

Components of Regional Consortia Plans

Regional Consortia Plans must include:

1. Evaluation of existing AE programs.
2. Evaluation of AE needs.
3. Plans to integrate programs.
4. Plans to address the gaps.
5. Plans to accelerate a student's progress.
6. Plans to collaborate on provision of professional development.
7. Plans to leverage existing regional structures.

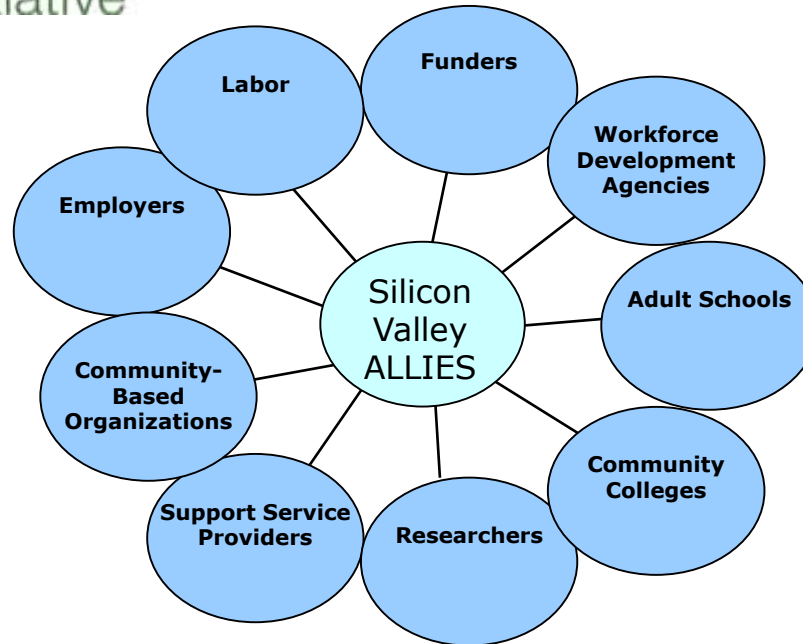
Silicon Valley ALLIES Innovation Initiative
